## **Engagement between OYEC Youth and City Staff**

2018 and 2019 have seen a dramatic increase in engagement between OYEC members and City departments and staff, both in monthly meetings and through working directly with subcommittees.

City staff and community partners visited OYEC meetings throughout 2018 to inform members of their work or to seek advisement from a body of young people.

#### Visits included:

For the first time, OYEC subcommittees are working with City departments to accomplish their goals:

### The new term in September 2018 saw the first annual OYEC weekend training:

- > Included a 3 hour crash-course on the City of Ottawa from Diana Knight, City staff liaison, a KAIROS Blanket Exercise and Anti-Oppression workshops.
- This item was greatly enjoyed by members understanding and knowledge of the City's structure has increased tenfold in the 2018-2019 term.

#### To futher increase engagement between city staff and counselors, OYEC is working on the following initiatives:

> With the election of seven new City Councillors in late 2018, members decided to collectively write a letter to all Councillors.

> Inviting City Departments into OYEC meetings based on current Term of Council priorities, including: Community and Social Services re: Housing & Homelessness Strategy, Ottawa Next: Beyond 2036, and the new downtown library project.



## **Youth Outreach**

OYEC is reaching out to youth and schools through the applicationprocess, consultations, the Mayor for a Day Contest, and soon, a social media presence, and community organizations via subcommittee project partnerships.

- > The 2018-2019 call for submissions saw our highest ap cation numbers to date.
- > Forty youth applied for 10 open spots, with the applications being spread via Youth Ottawa's extensive comm nity partner network and through Youth Ottawa and th City of Ottawa's social media channel.
- > During 2018 consultations, the Youth Consultations Subcommittee spoke with approximately 100 youth in Ottawa to determine their 2018-2019 priorities.
- > At the 2019 Mayor for a Day launch event at Immaculata High School, an OYEC member and the OYEC Co-ordinator spoke to a group of 100 students about th contest and committee itself.
- Posters for the contest were mailed to every high school in Ottawa in both 2018 and 2019 and the contest detail were emailed to all teachers in Youth Ottawa's network, many of whom use Mayor for a Day as a civics assignme
- > The promotional video was watched over 5,000 times a 170 submissions were received in 2019 -double the sub missions of the 2018 contest.



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## **A Diverse Committee**

## **Connecting Youth and Municipal Decision Makers**

Three OYEC initiatives were developed and launched in 2018 to encourage broader youth engagement with the municipal government: youth consultations, Mayor for a Day, and Councillors in Civics Classes.

#### **Youth Consultations**

- > OYEC organized and held four youth consultations to build their 2018-2019 Youth Action Plan: one each for racialized, Franco-phone, and Indigenous youth, and a final consultation open to all youth (that was well-attended by LGBTQ+ and rural youth).
- The consultations included an activity that asked participants to identify the City services they use from an inclusive list, leading to an in-depth discussion, thus increasing participants' knowledge of the City of Ottawa.

The current OYEC committee consists of 20 members, appropriately and robustly reflecting Ottawa's diversity, with:

- 1/3 of members in high school and 2/3 employed or in post-secondary education.
- 4 Indigenous youth (highest number to date).
- 18 racialized youth.
- 3 LGBTQ+ youth.
- Over half of the committee coming from newcomer and immigrant families.
- At least 5 youth self-identified as coming from a low-income background.
- Over half of Ottawa's municipal wards represented.
- Members that are engaged with other advocacy groups and organizations in their schools or the city at large.



# MAYOR FOR A DAY

#### **Mayor for a Day**

> Launched in February 2018 in partnership with Mayor Jim Watson's Office to build excitement around the municipal government.

- The contest asks Grade 9-12 students to suggest improvements to the City of Ottawa in either essay or video format, encouraging them to research and better understand the City's responsibilities.
- Two winners are selected to shadow the Mayor for a day and discuss their ideas.

#### **Councillors in Civics**

- > This initiative was developed by two high school OYEC members in partnership with Council Liaison Councillor Mathieu Fleury and his staff.
- The members wrote two toolkits: one for teachers and one for City Councillors.
- The toolkit for teachers includes a lesson plan that prepares students for a Councillor visit, while the toolkit for Councillors outlines an engaging classroom visit for Councillors to follow.
- The program is currently in its pilot phase, with the first visit from Councillor Catherine McKenney happening at Lisgar Collegiate Institute in January 2019.
- Throughout 2019, the program will be edited based on teacher, student, and Councillor feedback, and a finalized version will be presented as an open-source document by September 2019, with visits continuing to be organized by OYEC members.
- Members identified through conversations with their peers and mining their own experience that youth engagement with the municipal government is low because understanding, the first step of engagement, is very low.
- Members hope to increase young people's knowledge of the municipal government, its services, and the role of Councillors by encouraging more Councillors to visit civics classes in a guided, youth-friendly format.

## **Youth Action Showcase**

Our job is to bring youth voice to City Hall, but OYEC can't do it all, so Youth Ottawa sets up two yearly touch points (in November and May) for Councillors and City staff to connect more broadly with youth in Ottawa.

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## **Regular Meetings and Progress Assessment**

#### OYEC meets monthly at City Hall with meetings split between visitor presentations and consultations, and subcommittee work to monitor the Youth Action Plan.

- > Two-hour meetings of the committee allow ample time for both a comprehensive visit from a City staff or community partner, aiming to build relationships and increase engagement, and subcommittee work periods for effective monitoring of the Youth Action Plan goals.
- > As the 2016-2019 Youth Action Plan's final items are now in the hands of City staff and departments, OYEC developed a focused 2018-2019 Youth Action Plan based on the aforementioned youth consultations:
  - Improve youth's knowledge of and relationships with the City of Ottawa and City Councillors.

- Each subcommittee is made up of three to seven OYEC members with a lead who reports directly to the Youth Ottawa Coordinator.
- Subcommittees meet at least once a month outside of full committee meetings, with the lead sending meeting notes, next steps, and questions to the coordinator, who can direct City-related needs to the City staff liaison.
- This has proven to be a very effective way to structure the committee and will lead to many successful initiatives in 2019 and beyond.

Increase young people's access to sexual education & sexual health resources.

Build better relationships between racialized youth and City of Ottawa staff.

> Improve the City of Ottawa for Indigenous youth.

Devise a project to combat youth unemployment in Ottawa.

# **Effective Relationships** with City Staff

Youth Ottawa and assigned City Staff maintained an outstanding relationship based on mutual respect and shared commitment to the OYEC project.

- > Quarterly in-person meetings and regular phone/email communications were held between Diana Knight, City staff liaison, and Emma Buchanan, OYEC Coordinator, to review OYEC priorities.
- Effective division of labour, where the City staff liaison is responsible for room bookings, arranging food for meetings, and building connections with City Departments, and the Youth Ottawa Coordinator is responsible for writing agendas and minutes, managing members, and overseeing Youth Action Plan progress.
- > Councillor Mathieu Fleury, City Council liaison for OYEC, is regularly updated on committee activities by the Coordinator and visits meetings at least twice a year to update members on City Council priorities and to remind them of his supportive role.

## **Membership Satisfaction**

When asked directly in a recent evaluation survey (January 2019), 88% of OYEC members (or 15 out of 17 respondents) said they are "highly satisfied" with OYEC as an opportunity to increase knowledge of municipal services, staff, and policies.
